JANUARY 14th ALLYSHIP PROGRAM WELL ATTENDED AND RECEIVED



Over 70 people attended the January 14th Allyship and Racial Justice webinar featuring a multigenerational panel of women representing various organizations from the State College community. Panelists shared their diversity, equity, and inclusion experiences as well as their experiences in allyship, the challenges in working with allies, and offered some tips in the process. APPLICANTS SOUGHT FOR AAUW STATE COLLEGE BRANCH SCHOLARSHIPS

AAUW State College seeks applicants for four undergraduate scholarships to be awarded for the academic year 2021–2022 (Fall 2021 until Summer 2022). An applicant must be a woman who:

- is a Centre County resident - with intent to maintain such residency for the duration of the grant - although she may attend a college or university located outside the county;
- is seeking her first associate or baccalaureate degree on a part- or full-time basis;
- has interrupted her studies for at least two years or delayed higher education for at least two years after graduating from high school, having enrolled in a post-secondary institution;
- has completed at least one quarter of the course work required for the degree (15 credits for an associate degree or 30 credits for a baccalaureate degree);
- demonstrates financial need, academic promise, clarity of educational goals, and service to the community.

References and financial information are required. The awards range from \$3,000 to \$7,000, depending on financial need and the recipient's circumstances. 
JUDICIAL VOTING DISTRICTS UNDER CONSIDERATION

Fair Districts opposes HB 38, a bill that would change the way we choose judges. Presently, we vote statewide on judges for the appellate courts. This bill would result in judges being elected by districts established by the legislature, resulting in the likelihood of additional gerrymandering. No other state does this, and most do not even vote for judges.

HB 38 has been reported out of committee by one vote. It now goes to the entire PA House and then to PA Senate. If it passes the Senate by February 17, it will be on the ballot in the May primary. If passed in the May election, it will amend Pennsylvania's constitution. This bill has been proposed and pushed through with no transparency. The Judiciary Committee was given less than 24 hours before a vote (24 hours is required before voting on a bill), and there have been no public hearings and no posting requesting public comment.

It is important we contact our legislators regarding this, especially Representative Benninghoff and Senator Corman. If legislators are adhering to their stated goal of transparency, ask them why they are not doing so relative to this bill. Plus, be sure to express your reaction to the bill.

DYSFUNCTION BY DESIGN - Gerrymandering Webinar

This program will help us understand the ramifications of passing HB 38, as well as the impact of sending it to the Pennsylvania Senate and then for vote in the May primary in short order.

This year has forced us all to become more aware of the machinations of our democracy and its imperfections. As advocates, it is even more critical that we understand the gears that drive our Pennsylvania Legislature in order to become more effective at advancing our issues and priorities. The Pennsylvania General Assembly has been called one of the most ineffective in the country. This is evidenced by our gerrymandered districts which entrench incumbents in 'safe' districts, as well as House and Senate rules that ensure the power in Harrisburg lies in the hands of a handful of committee chairs. This allows them to dictate the bills that will come up for a vote in committee and end with majority leadership that dictates the bills that will make it to a full House or Senate vote.

As noted above, currently, there is a push to establish Judicial Voting Districts for appellate court judges, including the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, instead of the current process of electing them at-large. The result would be gerrymandered courts. Fair Districts PA has begun an information campaign to expose these systemic issues. The **ONLY** way to effect change is to increase awareness and motivate voters to let their representatives know that we demand fairness. **Register in advance for this webinar:**
