
Two of our newest AAUW State College members, Carline Creveceour and Grace Hampton, have been very busy of late. Congratulations to you both on your wonderful achievements.



Dr. Carline Creveceour, Author of Pressure Makes Diamonds

Carline's memoir is a refreshingly honest look at one family's decision to opt-out of mainstream education and home school their children.

Carline and her husband, Michael, both had successful careers as doctors, so in the beginning, home-schooling was never on their agenda. Over time, their reality changed, particularly after an accident involving their three-year-old son under the care of a babysitter. Carline quit her obstetrics and gynecology practice to home school all five of their African American children in a time when home-schooling, especially by Black parents, was a rarity.



Pressure Makes Diamonds illustrates how the family navigated the educational system by incorporating a variety of teaching approaches. The memoir chronicles Carline's 20-year journey of non-traditional education in Central Pennsylvania while dealing with issues of sibling rivalry, Haiti's 2010 earthquake, illnesses, death, racism, and other problems of life in our society. However, despite some adversity along their journey, all five children flourished, getting accepted into elite universities.

Dr. Grace Hampton, ENCORE Foundation Fellowship Recipient

Dr. Grace Hampton has received an **Encore Foundation/ Generation 2 Generation (Gen2Gen) fellowship** and a \$10,000 award to support and advance the *Weaving Wisdom: Fabrics and The Stories They Tell* project.

The Encore Foundation/Gen2Gen Innovation Fellowship is for innovators who are bridging generational divides. Each year the Encore Foundation selects 15 practical visionaries with great new ideas for putting generational connection and collaboration front and center in ways that benefit all ages, solve critical social problems, and mend our fraying social fabric.

Dr. Hampton explains, "'Weaving Wisdom' is a community-focused project I designed in collaboration with two other members of Penn

State's *Intergeneration Leadership Institute*. The project uses the communicative power of the arts to increase communication between older adults and younger individuals. Kente and Adinkra cloths, American quilts, and basketry from West Africa are used to show how cultural values, social norms, heritage, and the history of nations, communities, and families can be transmitted between generations."

The Encore Foundation provides advice, mentorship, visibility, and other support to replicate and elevate the program to national prominence.

Janet Oh, Director of the Gen2Gen program, shared the following in a letter to Grace, "We are so thrilled to let you know that you have been selected as a fellow for the Gen2Gen Innovation Fellowship! Our team is so impressed with your ability to meaningfully connect older adults and younger individuals through art and conversation." 
DIVERSITY CORNER




¡ADELANTE! BOOK CLUB TO MEET JANUARY 20
