AAUW INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIPS HELP WOMEN WHO CHANGE the WORLD

AAUW State College's International Fellowship has funded international women for 40 years



In recognition of AAUW's 140th anniversary, AAUW CEO Gloria Blackwell recently interviewed **Dr. Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala**, the first woman and African to serve as the Director-General of the World Trade Organization. Thanks to an AAUW International Fellowship, Dr. Okonjo-Iweala was able to complete a Ph.D. in Regional Economics and Development at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Dr. Okonjo-Iweala's career has been marked by excellence: she twice served as Nigeria's Finance Minister, received numerous awards reflecting her international influence, served on over 30 corporate and nonprofit boards, authored five books, and reared five children. In 2019 she became an American citizen. AAUW awarded Dr. Okonjo-Iweala with its Distinguished 2021 AAUW Alumnae Recognition Award.

Forty years ago, with funds primarily from our Used Book Sale, AAUW State College established an International Fellowship Endowment at AAUW. Funds generated from our endowment are combined with other fellowship endowment funds to sponsor women from around the world in pursuit of graduate degrees.

In the past 18 years, AAUW State College Fellowship recipients have come from Ghana, India, Kenya, Malawi, Israel, Nepal, and Mongolia to study in fields such as computer engineering, environmental science, sociology, health and medical sciences, and physics.

Meet Raheleh Daneshpour, 2021-2022 AAUW International Fellowship Recipient Studying at Penn State, University Park



Raheleh Daneshpour, from Iran, is a third-year Ph.D. student in chemical engineering. She stated that she feels honored to be the recipient of the 2021-2022 AAUW international fellowship. During her Ph.D. journey, she has worked on different topics that all focus on environmental issues. She had comprehensive research on water treatment methods applicable in different areas, from removing microbial contamination from irrigation water and municipal wastewater to detecting microbial growth in water in space crafts.

In another part of her research, Raheleh is implementing her nanoparticle synthesis expertise in a project aiming to produce hydrogen from splitting water. Hydrogen is considered one of the most promising future green energy sources. In this project, we use non-precious metals as the catalyst to split water for hydrogen production. She will use high-tech characterization technologies to study the catalyst activity and optimize performance. Raheleh commented that being an AAUW awardee made her research activities much easier. Her fellowship was funded in part by AAUW State College.

AAUW'S AMERICAN FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM SUPPORTS DOCTORAL STUDENTS

The AAUW American Fellowship program began in 1888, a time when women were discouraged from pursuing an education. It is AAUW's largest fellowship program and the oldest non-institutional source of graduate funding for women in the United States.

AAUW American Fellowships support women scholars who are pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Candidates are evaluated on the basis of scholarly excellence; quality and originality of project design; and active commitment to helping women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research. American Fellowships are used to complete dissertations, for postdoctoral research leave, and for short-term research publication grants.




Meet Naila Smith, 2021-2022 AAUW American Fellowship Recipient Studying at Penn State, University Park

Dr. Naila Smith is a developmental psychologist, who is currently an Africana Research Center Post-Doctoral Scholar in the Department of Psychology at The Pennsylvania State University. Dr. Smith’s research examines the role of resources, assets, and risks in the academic and socioemotional development of marginalized youth, with a focus on Black and immigrant youth from childhood to emerging adulthood (ages 18-25).

She received an American Postdoctoral Fellowship from AAUW for the 2021-2022 academic year for a project that examines how individual, (teacher characteristics), relational (e.g., family-school collaboration), and school contextual factors may explain teacher-parent reporting discrepancies of Black girls’ socioemotional learning in kindergarten. Upon completing her fellowship, Dr. Smith will return to her faculty role as tenure-track Assistant Professor of Psychology at Dickinson College.

On a personal note, Dr. Smith is a proud Jamaican, who enjoys spending her downtime reading sci-fi, lurking in the Twitterverse, and singing karaoke.




¡ADELANTE! BOOK CLUB to MEET JANUARY 20th
