

Spring Primary Election May 16

Voters are nominating candidates for judicial positions, school board seats, and county offices. Member Nancy Chiswick shares that only about 25% of registered voters in PA are likely to vote on Tuesday, May

16 in the Primary. That means a very small number of voters determine who will be on the ballot in November. Branch Public Policy Co-Chairs Mary Dupuis and Dianne Gregg shared a *Candidates Guide* based on public sources, sent April 23. Education Committee Updates

The Primary Election is Tuesday, May 16, 2023. Among those up for election are five places on the SCASD Board. This is a very important election because the school board shapes the priorities of our public schools and influences the quality of education.

Education Voters of Pennsylvania describes a school board as "an elected body responsible for governing the school district." It levies taxes and adopts an annual budget based on available funding from state and local sources, approves the hiring and compensation of personnel, approves curriculum and textbooks, appoints the superintendent, and enacts policy.

Some of the qualities we look for in our school board members are the ability to function as a team (there are 10 members), the ability to listen to all sides, and make a decision for the good of the school district. They should do this without a political agenda and not impose their personal beliefs on the students and staff.

Keep the above in mind when you look at the profiles from the Public Policy Committee. **Laurel Zydney**, an AAUW State College Branch member, is running for the SCASD Board. Laurel is affiliated with neither of the two candidate slates. She is running as an independent candidate. Learn more about Laurel's candidacy: <u>LaurelForSCASD.com</u>. Voters may vote for any five of candidates from among the eleven candidates running.

What is at stake in school board elections this year



Note: AAUW State College Public Policy Co-Chair Mary Dupuis shared this illuminating piece from Sue Spicka, Executive Director of Education Voters PA.

On the May 16th primary election, voters in 499 school districts across Pennsylvania will determine which school board candidates will appear on the fall ballot. Candidates who advance to the fall election will, ultimately, be elected to positions where they will have enormous power to shape the priorities of our local public schools and influence the quality of education students in our communities receive.

In recent years, Pennsylvania has become a focal point for extremist politicians, including at the school district level. In some places extremists will be running for school board to promote a political agenda and impose their personal and religious beliefs on students, teachers, and district staff. Their goals will include enacting regressive book bans, censorship of classroom discussions about race and gender identity, and policies discriminating against individual students because they identify as LGBTQ+.

Our communities depend on school boards to use tax dollars wisely and to ensure that our local schools will provide students with the opportunities that will allow them to thrive in school today and succeed in life after graduation. In districts that have elected a majority of extremists to their boards, we have seen tax dollars wasted on legal bills defending extremist policies instead of being invested in educating children.

Ultimately, we have seen that extremist boards have little concern for the quality of education students receive.

Make a Plan to Vote on Tuesday, May 16

School board elections are nonpartisan, so candidates can "cross-file" and have their name appear on both the Republican and Democratic ballot. You will NOT know the party of a candidate when you vote. This makes it critical for you to learn about candidates' values BEFORE you go to the polls or vote by mail.

Our communities depend on school boards acting in good faith. We depend on them to use tax dollars wisely. We depend on them for schools that provide students with opportunities to thrive today and succeed after graduation. We depend on them to listen to us—their constituents—and not an extremist agenda.

So we can't let 2023 be an "off year" election. We need to show up and take a stand against extremism so that our communities—and our children—can come first.

April 10 Women Behind Bars program reflections


The April 10 branch program on *Women Behind Bars* was very well-done. Thank you to branch members and presenters **Elizabeth Siegelman** and **Leslie Laing** for their hard work in this important area. For those who missed it, the program focused on Community Conferencing Centre

County's reentry work at the Centre County Correctional Facility (CCCF) and the recent grant they were awarded by PCCD (Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency) for their Women's Reentry Services Initiative. Leslie is also a member of the Pennsylvania Prison Society, which is the sole organization in the Commonwealth with legal authority to visit any prison or jail.

The issues around women who are incarcerated and current efforts to attend to those issues real. Program attendee Sally Kalin noted, "I was enlightened by *Women Behind Bars*. There were so many things I did not know. It underscored the blatant discrimination against women and others in the criminal justice system that begins even before people are convicted (and some are not). Denying women basic needs like menstrual products is inhumane."

AAUW State College membership updates



AAUW State College Branch members whose dues expired at the end of March or will expire at the end of April, May, June or July are scheduled to receive a "reminder to pay dues" email from the national AAUW office during the week of April 24. [Existing 50-year Honorary Life members will **not** receive this reminder.] As noted in an earlier

newsletter article, national dues for fiscal year 2024 will increase to \$72, of which \$69 is tax deductible. AAUW national life membership is \$1,440 and is fully tax deductible.

It is anticipated that AAUW-PA dues will increase from \$10 to \$12 effective July 1, 2023. Branch dues will remain at \$8. So going forward, most AAUW-State College Branch members will pay \$92 in annual dues, \$90 if they make payment prior to July 1. For existing members who wish to self-renew online through the Community Hub, instructions will be provided in the email as to the process. For members who prefer to pay dues by check, please make that check payable to AAUW-State College Branch, Inc. and send it to Membership Renewal, AAUW-State College Branch, P.O. Box 735, State College, PA 16804.

As many of you may recall, national AAUW introduced a Community Hub last year to give members the option of renewing membership online and using a credit card for dues payment. Unfortunately, the Community Hub's implementation was troubled; and we ultimately encouraged State College Branch members to pay dues by check mailed to our P.O. Box. Right now, we don't know if this year's online membership renewal process will proceed smoothly or not, so stay tuned.

National AAUW officially counts membership as of February 1 of each year. As of that date, the State College Branch had 144 members, which makes it the largest branch in Pennsylvania. Like many other membership organizations, our Branch membership numbers dropped during the pandemic, but it has rebounded for several reasons. At this year's Used Book Sale, we will again offer to new members half-price national, state, and local membership dues. If you know someone who would like to become an AAUW-State College member, encourage them to attend the Used Book Sale and join at this special rate of \$45. There will be a branch information table in the front lobby at the sale with membership applications.

In closing, here is another membership tidbit. AAUW State College was ranked #1 in Pennsylvania for donations to AAUW by a branch, #4 in Pennsylvania for donations by branch members to AAUW, and #3 overall. We are thrilled at the impact that our branch has!

information was shared with the Board, who were then asked to submit their ideas for the next strategic plan. Subsequently, the Board approved four themes for the new Strategic Plan: Organizational Stability and Sustainability; Contributions to Society and Community Engagement; Communications; and Used Book Sale and Fund-raising. In December 2022, four Strategic Planning Teams were appointed to address these themes.

The goals and objectives in the attached 2023-2026 Strategic Plan were compiled from the reports of the Teams, e-mail exchanges, ideas solicited from Branch members, personal conversations, and the assessment of the 2018-2021 Strategic Plan.

There is still work to be done, including setting priorities, assigning responsibilities for implementation, and crafting budgets to reflect our future directions.
