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
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# How women of color transformed the suffrage movement

# Your 2024 Ballot: offices & this year's primary election calendar

In presidential election years, Pennsylvania votes a month earlier than usual. **Our Primary election day, April 23,** falls on a Jewish holiday, so if you are observant you may want to vote by mail.

Nominating petitions to get candidates' names placed on the ballot will circulate up through February 13. Candidates are always grateful for your signatures. If you feel strongly in support of a candidate, you might want to ask that campaign for their petition—even 4-5 signatures would be welcome.


We are voting for federal and state level officers: President, U.S. Senator (Sen. Casey's seat); Congressman, Pennsylvania Senate, and Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Democrats also vote for delegates to the Democratic National Convention.

Centre County is divided into two Pennsylvania districts, following the most recent redistricting. The former Jake Corman district has been split into central, eastern, and western. The central seat is now held by Senator Cris Dush of Jefferson County. Southwestern Centre is in a separate district represented by Senator Wayne Langerholc Jr. of Cambria County.

Centre County has three state representatives. State College is split between Rep. Scott Conklin, Philipsburg, and Rep. Paul Takac, College Township. Both their districts are entirely within the county. Kerry Benninghoff, Bellefonte, has most of Penns Valley and Mifflin County.

No campaign is a sure thing until candidates successfully file their petitions and the accompanying paperwork. We will let you know who they are after the petition deadline has passed.

### **Basic Education Funding Commission updates**



The Basic Education Funding Commission (BEFC) is a bipartisan commission tasked with developing recommendations for Pennsylvania's school funding system. The goal is to meet the state constitutional responsibility of providing adequate and equitable funding for public education. This was a result of a ruling by the Commonwealth Court in February 2023, which stated that the administration and Legislature are failing to provide each

student with a high-quality public education.

The next step is to call or write Governor Shapiro (<a href="https://www.governor.pa.gov/contact/">https://www.governor.pa.gov/contact/</a>) and encourage him to introduce this plan into his 2024-25 budget proposal and discourage implementation of a new school voucher program before public schools are fully funded in compliance with the Commonwealth Court order. The state has limited funding for education,

and vouchers take away tax dollars that are available for public schools. Branch members and SCASD school board directors Jackie Huff and Donna Smith, a BASD board member, wrote an excellent article in the January 24 issue of the *Centre Daily Times*, titled <u>Shapiro must step up</u>, <u>be a champion for public schools</u>. They provide excellent reasons for the increased funding.

#### **Branch-funded STEM event updates**



Making "slime" was a fun part of Bellefonte Family STEAM Night.

The STEM Committee strives to support the education of women and girls throughout Centre County in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. Recently, through its partnership with Discovery Space, the STEM Committee provided a program called STEMPOWERED. For 16 weeks, three groups of girls in grades 5-6 from Bellefonte Elementary, Penns Valley Elementary, and Penns Valley Intermediate schools went on field trips to various research laboratories at Penn State to meet female faculty and graduate students and to learn about their various career paths. Some of the students also visited the Frost Entomology Museum, the Penn State Equine Center, and Shaver's Creek Environmental Center. Both school districts provided transportation for the field trips to express support for our efforts.

In November, we provided a mini-grant to the Bellefonte Area School District to purchase children's books focused on science. The heroine or the author of 90% of these books were women. The books were awarded as prizes at the Bellefonte Family STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) Night, on November 8, which was also National STEM

Day. The two-hour event featured science activities and demonstrations by Penn State students and teachers from the school district.

This month, we helped fund the <u>EMPOWER Conference</u> hosted by Penn State's Graduate Women in Science (GWIS). This all-day conference on campus welcomed individuals working, studying, and interested in STEM at all career stages. EMPOWER, an annual professional and personal development event, featured keynote speaker Wawa Gatheru. Gatheru is an Environmental Justice Warrior, and Black Girl Environmentalist Founder. Several AAUW members were in attendance.

The AAUW STEM Committee is also sponsoring two upcoming events: <u>ENVISION: STEM Career Day Supporting Young Women</u> and the <u>AAUW State College Merit-Based STEM Scholarships</u> to Science-U. ENVISION, scheduled for **Saturday, February 24**, is a day-long event inviting girls and young women in grades 6-12 to the University Park campus for hands-on STEM activities, talks, and networking. Thanks to the scholarship program, approximately a dozen Centre County girls will have the opportunity to attend a week-long <u>Science-U summer science camp</u> of their choice, free of charge. Many girls from the Penns Valley school district have participated in the scholarship program this year, and we look forward to several more girls and young women from other school districts attending ENVISION and Science-U.

## Branch-led January 25 Humphrey program well-received

The AAUW-State College-led Humphrey Fellows Lunch, International Perspectives on Women in Society, was held on January 25.

Panelists included Dr. Odgerel Batsaikhan, Vice Director of Otgontenger University in Mongolia, and Ninoska Leiva, a professor at the University of Chile and the University of Santiago de Chile. Both panelists shared interesting stories, at times inspirational, about their countries. Branch member Sophie Penney Leach commented, "The program was moving and insightful. It left me deeply grateful that I live in the United States and yet at the same time, wondering if or how we as AAUW members can help make a difference in the lives of women in other parts of the world. While we still have a long road to go toward equity in the United States, hearing that only 40% of women in Chile work outside the home and they pay 30% more for insurance because they can have children leads one to wonder how you can serve as an advocate for change elsewhere because we are all sisters no matter our location."

The event was co-sponsored by Altrusa International Centre County, Community Diversity Group, Global Connections, Soroptimist Centre County, and Ten Thousand Villages State College. # Cultural Empowerment for Women Luncheon program set for Tuesday, March 12



Our book club is modeled after the AAUW Diversity Outreach for Impact Program,


featuring diverse cultures in both fiction and nonfiction offerings. The next meeting will be on **Thursday, March 21**, at **2:30 pm**.



#### Louise Tukey January 28, 1927 - January 4, 2024

State College – it is the "end of an era." On Thursday, January 4, 2024, long-time State College resident and community volunteer Louise Tukey died after more than 70 years of contributing to the local community. Louise arrived in State College in 1951 and immediately became part of the fiber of Centre County. She participated in the founding of the Women's Resource Centre, Phone-A-Friend, Schlow Library, University Women's Club,

League of Women Voters, Centre County Historical Society (life member), and many more initiatives focused on bettering the lives of women and children in State College.

Louise's most impactful contribution was as a founding member for AAUW State College's annual Used Book Sale. Beginning with the first sale at the Wesley Foundation through its current day iteration, Louise volunteered countless hours pricing and organizing books, working with book buyers and sellers, assisting with funds allocation for scholarships for returning adult women and local community betterment projects, and promoting the works of AAUW locally, throughout the state, and nationwide.

Louise was tenacious, sometimes difficult, determined, and steadfast in her convictions. If you met Louise or worked with Louise, you would always remember the interaction. Yes, it is the end of an era for her active contributions, but her memory will live on for many years to come in the stories people tell about all the contributions she made to State College as a community.
