

## Cultural Empowerment for Women - Tuesday, March 12




Osage Indians were murdered in cold blood for access to their valuable shares of oil money.

## Did you want to vote by mail?



Our primary election is on **April 23**. We know you are expecting it to be in May, but this is a presidential election year, so we go a month early.

With less than two months to go, it is time to prepare if you want to vote by mail.

The first thing to know is, according to our state Legislature, "permanent" means "annual": you must renew your application for a mail-in ballot every year.

If you received a letter from our Elections Office asking if you wanted to vote by mail, that was the "permanent" part: they will reach out to you every year so long as you keep your application up-to-date annually by returning that letter, filled out.

If you returned your letter and indicated you want to keep voting by mail, you should have received an email acknowledging receipt from the Pennsylvania Department of State. That means, you are good to go and will receive your ballot in the mail once they are ready. Expect to receive your ballot about three weeks before election day.

If you did not get a letter or mislaid it, or if you have not applied before, you can go online to apply at <u>vote.pa.gov</u>. On that main page, scroll down to "mail-in and absentee ballots." **NOTE:** they are <u>not</u> the same thing! Mail-in ballots are *no excuses*; absentee ballots *need excuses* [just like in the old days]. You will be asked three questions. If you answer yes to any of them, you will be sent an absentee ballot. If you say no to all of them, you will be sent a mail-in ballot. Think of it this way: an absentee ballot would be good for one election [for instance, if you were planning to snowbird, so wanted to forward your mail] whereas the mail-in ballot would be something you want to do regularly. [Not to worry if you change your mind and want to switch back to in-person voting. You could take the blank mail-in ballot to your polling place

this election, or you could cancel your mail-in status on next year's letter.] There should be a box on the application asking if you want an annual request.

Please do not put off applying! The deadline is way too close to Election Day, given that the Post Office is slowing down even more. We will write up the candidates for you well ahead of the election so you can get your vote in with confidence.

## Women make history on the Pennsylvania high courts



For the first time in the history of Pennsylvania, all three of our appeals courts are led by women!

The Chief Justice of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court is **Madam Justice Debra Todd**. The President Judge of the PA Superior Court is **Judge Anne Lazarus**. The President Judge of the PA Commonwealth Court is **Judge Renee Cohn Jubelirer**. Renee is a native of State College and the daughter

of our long-time member, the late Trudy Levine, and her husband, Sam.

Additionally, the Supreme Court has seven members—three are women—making it the only one of these courts where men are in the majority.

The Superior Court has fifteen members—twelve women, two men, and one vacant seat up for election in 2025. The Commonwealth Court has nine members—seven women, two men.

## Recasting the Vote program look-back



The February 26 branch program, *Recasting the Vote: How Women of Color Transformed the Suffrage Movement,* featured the book of the same title. Presented by Penn State professor and author, Dr. Cathleen Cahill, the program was very engaging.

Dr. Cahill focused mostly on Mabel Ping-Hua Lee, born in China and raised in New York City. In 1921 she became the first Chinese woman in the United States to receive a

doctorate in economics but could not get a job in her field. She continued to advocate for women and Chinese immigrants throughout her life.

Branch member Linda Higginson commented, "Dr. Cahill's presentation was so interesting and informative. She discussed history about suffrage activists, highlighting again the realization of how much history has not been taught in schools over the years."

## Branch-sponsored program on mental health - April 11



Mark your calendar for an evening program on Thursday, April 11, offered by Dr. Chemba Raghavan, a Human Development and Family Studies professor from Penn State. She is Senior Advisor, Early Childhood Development, UNICEF. Her talk will focus on supporting mental health and empowering women who are caregivers of
