



## **Celebrating Our Differences**

It was certainly unique, and to my mind, somewhat brave. But mostly it was a real reminder that change can be beautiful. Lolita fashion ( $\Box J - \beta \cdot \partial \gamma \gamma ) = \lambda$ ) is a subculture from Japan that is highly influenced by Victorian clothing and styles from the Rococo period. Lolita originated as a reaction against stifling Japanese society, in which young people are pressured to strictly adhere to gender roles and the expectations and responsibilities that are part of these roles. While the name "Lolita" has a negative connotation in the west due to the novel by Vladimir Nabokov, within Japanese culture the name refers to cuteness and elegance rather than to anything sexual.

I began dressing in Lolita fashion after living in Japan for six years (2004-2010). That time period was my first experience living on my

own and really figuring out who I was going to be as an adult, so Japan and Japanese culture remain precious to me! Lolita fashion helps me to stay close to Japan, even though I am 7,000 miles away.

Change Can Be Good! - As a still relatively new member (I joined in July 2024), new board member, and an attendee/alum of the AAUW-PA Summer Retreat, I am simply bursting with ideas for AAUW and its future! But...sometimes when I bring up an idea, the response is less-than-enthusiastic. "Yeah, good luck with that..." "Oh, probably not, we've never done that before." "Someone tried that five years ago and it didn't work out..."

I would like to encourage everyone to pause before responding when presented with an idea and try to see the potential in trying new things. We are members of an always evolving and changing organization, so it is essential that we evolve and change too.


### Time to renew your AAUW membership?
