PUBLIC POLICY

Public Policy Primer Look-Back

At the August 13 *Public Policy Primer*, held at Foxdale Village, Public Policy Co-Chair **Dianne Gregg** discussed the significance of the 2025 Pennsylvania Supreme Court retention vote. The three judges who will be up for retention have supported issues related to the AAUW's


mission. Dianne encouraged members to familiarize themselves with the issues at stake, and to support all three incumbent candidates for judicial retention in November.



Kat Miller spoke about several avenues for contacting potential voters and encouraging turnout for odd-year and midterm elections, including VoteForward (https://votefwd.org/) and Postcards to Voters (https://votefwd.org/) and Postcards to Voters (https://postcardstovoters.org/). They also reviewed how applications such as 5Calls (https://5calls.org/) make it easy to contact the offices of our elected representatives. The goodsuniteus.com website was mentioned as a way of searching a brand to see its' politics. While the AAUW is a nonpartisan organization, members were encouraged to speak up about the issues affecting education, equity, the wage gap, and more.

League of Women Voters Centre County to Host Why Courts Matter



Tuesday, September 2, 7:00 pm Foxdale Village Auditorium

With five statewide judges up for retention votes on this November's ballot, it is a critical time to understand the court system in Pennsylvania and how it affects citizens' lives. Thomas Kistler, now a Senior Judge for Pennsylvania courts, will provide an overview of our state's court system and answer live and zoom audience questions.

LWVCC hopes this community event will help voters learn about the Pennsylvania Court system, and the Judge Retention votes on the ballot November 4, 2025.

A Pennsylvania judge is first elected in a partisan race, then is on the ballot for retention at the end of their term. The non-partisan retention vote (judges are not identified by party on this ballot) is either a YES to retain, or a NO to not retain. Retained judges continue to serve, and

face retention votes until their retirement. Judges not retained will finish their term, and then the Governor appoints a new judge to serve until the next odd-year election.

Making Our Voices Heard, Roundtable Discussion

The Centre County Constitution Day Celebration will be held on Saturday, September 20 at the Delta High School on Westerly Parkway, State College. There will be deliberative roundtables on issues of importance to our democracy.

David Hutchinson, Constitution Day Chair, explains that attendees will be asked to address several foundational questions: What values do Americans share? What could we do to make our political conversations more productive? How might the Bill of Rights be adapted for today? These are not questions with easy or simple answers. The U.S. Constitution remains the practical framework for how our democracy functions. But the leaders of that era could not have anticipated everything, and they knew that important issues were being left for future generations to resolve. Trained moderators who will ensure that every voice is heard, and will be shared with both the community and our elected officials.


