Program on Community Action Grant allocations: Thursday, February 19

Learn about the branch's Community Action Grant allocation at the **Thursday, February 19th program, held in the Foxdale meeting room (second floor), 6:00-7:30 pm.** In the current Community Action Grant cycle, AAUW State College received 20 applications requesting a combined \$116,514. At the January 12 branch board meeting, the Community Action Grants Committee recommended funding **\$65,000 to 13 organizations** to deliver high-impact services across Centre County. This level of demand demonstrates both the breadth of community need and the strength of our partner organizations; allocating funds to the most promising proposals



ensures measurable outcomes while responsibly stewarding the proceeds from our annual book sale. Funded projects targeting barriers that women and girls face in our region include:

- literacy and ESL instruction (**Mid-State Literacy Council**)
- girls' STEM education (**CentreSTEM Inc.**)*
- dental care access (**Centre Volunteers in Medicine**)
- transportation to support employment (**Interfaith Human Services**)
- recovery support for women (**Go ReEntry**)
- mother-daughter relationship workshops (**Jana Marie Foundation**)
- community female health resources (**Schlown Centre Region Library**)
- early-childhood assessments (**CenClear**)
- investments in internships that elevate young women's voices (**C-NET**)
- help low-income women access medical appointments (**CentreHelps**)
- targeted early-education staff development (**Park Forest Preschool**)
- support for Children's Day at the Arts Festival (**Central Pa. Festival of the Arts**)
- mindfulness writing for women to help overcome trauma (**Ridgelines**)

**CentreSTEM was funded this year through Community Action Grants but will be considered in the future for a STEM grant through the AAUW State College STEM Committee grant program.*

Collectively, these investments advance equity for women and girls, aligning squarely with AAUW's mission and our branch's focus on education, economic security, and advocacy.


Community Diversity Group & AAUW lunch and program on retirement security Wednesday, March 18; sign up today

January 14 Title IX program strikes a chord

The January 14th branch program on Title IX brought out a crowd, with 45 attendees present either virtually or in person. Peg Pennepacker, speaker and Title IX expert and consultant, started with a history of the 1972 law, which follows:

No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal assistance.

Next, Peg reminded the group that Title IX pertains to far more than athletics. The example of girls being stigmatized from participating in STEM fields is another area where girls traditionally have been treated differently, and there are many others. Today, Title IX focus

areas include pregnant and parent students, athletics participation opportunities, and transgender participation in athletics.

Title IX law is very dependent on the political landscape at the time. Currently, many Title IX regulations have been vacated or rescinded. Enforcement of the law, even in a supportive environment, is a tremendous challenge. To date, no school has ever lost federal funding over Title IX violations. As community members, we must press for our schools to investigate, stop, prevent, and remedy potential violations of the law. Title IX is at the heart of efforts to create gender equitable schools.

Use Action Network to engage Congress for Department of Education

It is time to use the AAUW Action Network to call upon Congress for protection of the U.S.



Department of Education. As Meghan Kissell, AAUW (National) Senior Director, Policy & Member Advocacy points out, “only Congress can eliminate or restructure the Department of Education. Interagency shifts don’t cut bureaucracy—they create confusion for states and schools, weaken protections for students (especially students with disabilities), and undermine equal educational opportunity.”

She continues, “The Department’s unlawful transfer of education programs jeopardizes students’ civil rights. The Administration continues to freeze funding that Congress has directed under law—for education, childcare, health care, and more. Vote By Mail Applications



If you are voting by mail, you should have gotten a letter from the Centre County Elections Office about applying to stay on their list. In Pennsylvania, that list is annual, meaning, you must reapply every year or you get dropped from the list.

People are speculating that voting by mail could be dangerous due to various rumors of election interference. Our best information as of today is that voting by mail is safe. You could have a problem if you delay putting your ballot in the

mail because the Post Office has changed its policy on postmarking, resulting in delays. You avoid any worries about that by returning your ballot to one of the drop boxes the Elections Office sets up around the county, as those are collected by county staff, bypassing the Post Office altogether.

Other rumors suggest we may not have an election at all. Please be assured that elections are run by the states individually, not the federal government. State Secretaries of State are conferring about how to ensure elections occur and run smoothly. Speculation may continue all year, but please be assured that officials have heard all the same rumors you have and are working diligently to be sure nothing goes amiss.

Your letter from the Elections Office contains a form to be filled out to stay on their list to get a mail-in ballot. Filling it out and using the return envelope they have provided will have you on the list for both the primary and the general elections.

You can change your mind at any point by going to vote.pa.gov but frankly, the reapplication looks easier to us. And here's the benefit the campaigns don't tell you about: if you vote by mail, when your ballot is marked as received (you get an email confirming that), it's a matter of public record that you have already voted (not who you voted for, just that you voted). Any respectable campaign keeps tabs on that list, and they know there's no point in contacting you again.

The candidates on your ballot this year are Governor, member of Congress, and State Representatives. We'll let you know who the candidates are once they turn in their paperwork to the Department of State. Nominating petitions begin to circulate on February 17 and face a filing deadline of March 10.

Additionally, this is the year when the parties elect new officers. Republicans, your county officers go on the ballot and precinct committee persons are chosen afterward. Democrats follow the reverse order, with precinct people on your ballot; once they are elected, they choose their officers.

Stand with Fair Districts PA to support House Bill 31

It is time to start thinking about redistricting in Pennsylvania. We need the legislation passed

for a nonpartisan independent redistricting commission by 2030 in two separate legislative sessions. Politics should not enter into drawing the district lines, and the present system leaves it to politicians.

 Fair Districts Pennsylvania asks that we contact members of the Pennsylvania House by phone, now, including Majority Leader Matthew Bradford, 717-772-2572, and Speaker Joanna McClinton, 717-772-9850. Tell them your Pennsylvania Representative (Paul Takac or Scott Conklin) has signed on as a co-sponsor for HB 31 to create an independent redistricting commission that you support. Ask for

a vote in the State Government Committee and on the House Floor. The bill was referred to the House Government Committee on April 15, 2025. **Learn more:** [Fair Districts – HB 31](#).

MEMBER FOCUS

Branch members respond to program survey



In December, branch members received a survey about their interests in the branch, and more specifically, branch programs. Forty-eight (48) members responded to the survey. Not all respondents answered all questions. Here is a summary of [responses to the Survey](#):

- Networking with other women (46%), the chance to meet new people (38%), and donating/supporting a cause (67%) or advocating on issues (54%) were priorities to our membership.
- 61% of respondents attended between 1 and 5 meetings/programs throughout the year, and 26% attended more than five. Thirteen percent of respondents did not attend any meetings/programs.
- The biggest reason members do not attend meetings/programs is scheduling. Fifty-nine percent said they are busy during meeting times. When asked if weekend times would

be better than weekdays, 51% of respondents said it depends, while 45% said it made no difference.

- For format of meetings/programs, 45% of respondents preferred hybrid (in person and virtual) while 38% preferred in-person meetings.
- When asked which events they are most likely to attend, 91% indicated the book sale, 59% the holiday party, and 54% the Awards & Scholarship Banquet.
