URGENT: FAIR DISTRICTS PA CALL for ACTION by TUESDAY, JANUARY 18th

As redistricting progresses, Fair Districts PA members have been testifying and closely monitoring the process. Debbie Trudeau, who is active in Fair Districts PA and from Centre County, encourages the residents of the Centre Region and the State College Area School District to comment on the Pennsylvania Legislative Reapportionment Commission's (LRC) proposed Senate district for our geographical area, which cuts


State College in half. State College is a community of interest and will gain influence if it is not split; therefore, Debbie has helped to design a new district map (the PA Peoples Map) that incorporates State College and Centre County. You can see it at:

To compare it to the LRC map, select the LRC map from the drop-down menu in the upper right corner. Please send your comments on the maps immediately to www.redistricting.state.pa.us/comment. There is a button on the lower left for written testimony. Reference your interest in replacing the proposed LRC map with the PA Peoples Map and explain why you do not want to see our region divided. The last date for comments is January 18.

Remember that once every 10 years, Pennsylvania draws new district maps through the legislative redistricting process following the release of U.S. Census data. BACKGROUND on the PROPOSED PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATIVE and CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING

The proposed reapportionment of Pennsylvania's legislative maps for the House and Senate is close to being finalized. They are available for public comment, so if you have opinions, please express them.

There are some significant differences from the current district maps because our state population has shifted geographically. The two corners, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, have increased in population while the large center has lost population. To keep the same number of districts in the state legislature, rural districts will become geographically larger. The current state Senate seat has moved farther

west and north, placing Senator Corman in a district with another strong Republican, Senator Dush of Jefferson County. [Corman is not running for re-election to the state Senate but is a candidate for governor.] The new maps split State College between this district and one to the west and south that includes Clearfield County.

Our Pennsylvania legislators' districts also will change, but all the current representatives are in safe seats, for them. There is one new seat, which is narrowly Democratic, in the Centre Region (College, Harris, and parts of the Borough of State College, then north and west through Snow Shoe). Despite his expressed concerns, Representative Benninghoff has a secure Republican district. You can see the proposed House and Senate districts on the current draft map at spotlightpa.org/mydistrict. Interestingly, the area around State College is the only place in the large center of the state that has had an increase in population over the past ten years. The new proposed House districts are fairer than the Senate districts. Instead of four representatives [shared with three other counties], we now have three. Both the new district and Representative Conklin's districts are entirely within Centre County and share the Centre Region, while Representative Benninghoff has a significant proportion of Mifflin County in addition to Penns Valley.

As for the congressional map, all bets are off at this time. Since Pennsylvania will lose a seat statewide, the political negotiations are quite intense and no resolution has yet been reached. Where State College fits into that picture is not clear. So, stay tuned while the leaders of both parties discuss where the boundaries will be.

The timetable is under a great deal of pressure. The Secretary of State says all maps must be finalized by January 24 to give counties time to prepare nominating petitions for the start of the circulation period on Feb. 15. At present, the Legislature does not appear to be on track to meet that timetable.

We are watching the process and will continue to update you when and if anything changes. Stay tuned.
