"Watch Party" and Discussion on Reproductive Rights: Saturday, January 14, 9:30 am

AAUW State College invites you to a screening of the AAUW PA's webinar on the status of reproductive rights in

Pennsylvania. There will be a focus on health implications and possible legislative actions that could affect women and families in Pennsylvania. See Where AAUW Stands on Reproductive Rights.

The event will be held on **Saturday, January 14 from 9:30 am to noon at the home of Vasundara Varadan**. The program is open to branch members and *potential* members. Seating is limited to 20. There will be brunch-style refreshments and a discussion led by branch members Anne Ard and Carline Crevecoeur.

Anne Ard served as Executive Director of Centre Safe (formerly Centre County Women's Resource Center), a domestic violence shelter and rape crisis center for 25 years, retiring in 2022. In 2015, Anne was appointed by Governor Tom Wolf to the Pennsylvania Commission for Women.

Carline Crevecoeur is a retired obstetrician and gynecologist. She has worked extensively with breast cancer patients and victims of sexual violence. After 20 years of medical practice in New York and Pennsylvania, she relocated to State College where she volunteered as a physician for CVIM.

Legislatively, reproductive rights in Pennsylvania are now in flux.

It is a complex landscape with evolving challenges that extend nationwide. We cannot advocate for anything until we know what we're advocating for, and the first step is to have a clear idea of the landscape. **The deadline to sign-up is Tuesday, January 10**. 

His replacement is Amber Conception, President of the State College Area School Board.

Amber will be the first woman to serve as Commissioner in over 20 years. The new year brings us municipal elections, with the

Commissioner races at the top of the county ticket. We'll bring you the names of all the candidates as soon as we have them. For now, expect nominating petitions to begin to circulate on February 14, for county and local offices as well as for statewide judges.

SPOTLIGHT on Envision: Stem Career Day, February 25



ENVISION: STEM Career Day Supporting Young Women is a full day event organized by the Office of Science Outreach in the Eberly College of Science. The goal of ENVISION is to help girls and young women see themselves in careers in the STEM fields (science, technology, engineering, and math). At ENVISION, students in grades 6-12 come to the Penn State campus to listen to keynote speakers and participate in three hands-on workshops about various STEM topics. Attendees interact with female college students and STEM professionals who answer questions related to their research or their reasons for entering a STEM field.

Participants enjoy lunch together and connect with other girls interested in STEM.

Funding from AAUW helps to support **ENVISION** by providing supplies to the participants.

Student learning losses occur during pandemic



Recently released 2022 test scores, that reflect learning losses from the COVID-19 pandemic lock-downs, have been in the education news. All students felt the impact of the shutdowns, but students already struggling academically and girls seemed to fare worse. The usual testing was suspended in 2020 and participation in the 2021 Keystone exams was so low that it was not considered a representative sample. Thus, the best comparison is between 2019 and 2022 data.

Students learn best when safely in school where teachers can support them. Schools and teachers had little or no expertise with distance learning techniques prior to the COVID pandemic. Take-aways from the pandemic are that teachers need to better understand how to implement best practices of distance learning when needed and to integrate technology into their instruction.

Students, especially girls, need to know where they can turn for help. Also, teacher education programs must prepare new teachers to integrate technology into teaching and for the possibility of technology-based learning scenarios.

Update on Pregnant Workers Fairness Act

On December 16, the U. S. Senate voted 73 to 24 to pass the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act (PWFA). With overwhelming bipartisan support, PWFA passed as an amendment to the omnibus bill and will soon become a law.


This momentous win will allow millions of pregnant people to finally provide for their families without compromising their health or pregnancies. PWFA clarifies that it is unlawful to discriminate against pregnant workers by forcing them out of their jobs unnecessarily or denying them reasonable accommodations. Additionally, employers will be prohibited from retaliating against pregnant workers who request accommodations such as taking bathroom breaks.

¡ADELANTE! Book Club to meet February 23




MLK banquet set for January 15

Singers from Penn State, local high schools, and a historically Black university will celebrate the influence and inspiration of human-rights champion Martin Luther King Jr. in an event at 4 pm Saturday, January 21, in Eisenhower Auditorium.


