PUBLIC POLICY

What's on Your Ballot in 2025?



STATE LEVEL: All the statewide races are judicial. We have five retentions on the high courts and two vacancies to fill in 2025.

Retentions are how judges run for reelection. We do not have to circulate nominating petitions for them. Instead, they declare their desire to serve another term, and their names automatically go on the ballot. We vote on

them in the general election, where the question is, "Shall Judge So-and-So be retained on the [name of Court] for an additional 10-year term?" Vote yes or no.

Three of the retentions are for Supreme Court: Justices Christine Donohue, Kevin Dougherty, and David Wecht. All judges run in parties in Pennsylvania, but once elected, they are supposed to be nonpartisan. That is why they will not be identified by party on your ballot. Unfortunately, this set of retentions is likely to be highly contentious. The reason is that all three are registered as Democrats; their election 10 years ago swung the majority on the Court from Republican to Democrat. That led to the overturning of the old Congressional district map in favor of a new version that was more reflective of the basically even partisan divide in Pennsylvania. Certain Republicans are vowing to engage in a *Vote No* campaign to reverse majority control. A majority No vote would remove these judges from office and open their seats to election in the usual fashion.

We have one retention—**Judge Alice Beck Dubow**—and one vacant seat on Superior Court. This Court has the highest workload in the country, as it must hear all appeals sent to it. It deals principally with issues between people, as with family law. The other retention is **Judge Mike Wojcik** and one vacancy are on Commonwealth Court. Our Commonwealth Court is the only appeals court of its type in the country, mainly hearing cases involving government, such as with voting rights or cases where an individual has a conflict with a government entity.

COUNTY LEVEL: We have a retention for one county judge in Centre County: **Judge Katie Oliver**. As with the other retentions, this will be a yes or no vote in the fall, with no nominating petitions to circulate.


Our **District Attorney, Bernie Cantorna**, is up for reelection in the usual way, with nominating petitions to be circulated. He faces a primary election in May.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS: This is an election year for mayors, borough and township council seats, and school boards. Mayors and council candidates run in parties, but school board candidates can cross-file, meaning that they can run in both party primaries because those positions are supposed to be nonpartisan. As we have seen in recent years with Moms for Liberty and campaigns to censor library books, school boards can become very partisan. The best defense against mischief is the recruitment of good candidates who are fair-minded. Please keep your eyes open for talent. All these candidates would appreciate your help in circulating and signing their petitions. **The first day to circulate petitions is February 18**.



GRANTS & SCHOLARSHIPS

Branch Community Action Grants awarded for 2024-2025



Thanks to the annual AAUW State College Used Book Sale, the branch is able to give back to the community with sale proceeds. The grants fund programs of several Centre County nonprofits whose missions dovetail with our AAUW's mission to advance equity for women and girls.

Community Action Grants address women's needs in fields such as health care, literacy, economic self-sufficiency, and self-esteem. In December, Community Action Grants Chair **Sherry Crassweller** reported that the Grant Committee voted to award a total of **\$56,047** this month to programs of 11 Centre County nonprofits. They include:

- 3 Dots (Shine the Light on Central Pennsylvania Women Artists) \$10,000
- C-Net (female student internships for three semesters) \$1,500
- Central Pennsylvania Festival of the Arts (supporting Children's Day activities) \$5,000
- Centre Volunteers in Medicine (gynecological services) \$10,042
- Centre County Youth Service Bureau (youth services programs) \$1,950
- Centre Helps (community education program for low-income women) \$2,000
- Interfaith Human Services (emergency vehicle repairs) \$3,500
- Jana Marie Foundation (building confidence/self-identity through workshops) \$3,725
- Mid-State Literacy Council (basic literacy education for low-income women) \$15,750
- Park Forest Preschool (science skill education materials) \$580
- Schlow Centre Region Library (Great Women Through the Ages) \$2,000

AAUW national — Where we stand with the Equal Rights Amendment

AAUW advocates for the passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment "in order to guarantee equality, individual

rights and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society." The majority of Americans mistakenly believe that women and men have equal rights under our Constitution. The 14th Amendment of the Constitution explicitly states that men are guaranteed equality under law, but it does not mention women.

The advancement of women's equality continues incrementally through patchwork legislation and court decisions, but equality under law remains illusory as these laws can be changed or even revoked at the whim of legislators and judges. The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) would provide, once and for all, the constitutional guarantee that all men and women are truly equal under the law and that these rights cannot easily be abridged.
