Election Day November 8 - Cast Your Vote

Thanks to Branch Public Policy chairs Mary Dupuis and Dianne Gregg who provided a comprehensive Election Guide on pp. 2-3. They have added the following remarks.

The Election Guide on pp. 2-3 was published in the last issue. However, the changes in the public information about the election requires that we add the following: Pennsylvania's senate race is now seen nationally as one of the two or three races which will decide who controls the U.S. Senate. We see this as an opportunity to make Pennsylvania the leader in protecting women's rights. We hope you'll see it the same way. The most important thing you can do is vote, and the second most important thing is for you to press all your friends and relations to vote as well.

2022 Candidate Races

If you are so inclined, you can go to the AARP voter guides aarp.org/electionguides and search for Pennsylvania. Vote 411 hosts the League's statewide profiles.

For all five governor candidates, the clearest information is at Spotlight PA (spotlightpa.org). Scroll down to the article on the Governor's race titled "Your Complete Guide to the Candidates for Governor." We are not including the minor party candidates below, but as usual, we will cover all the major candidates for all levels.

Mary and Dianne penned a *Helping Hands* column on <u>Understanding Proposed Changes in the Pennsylvania Constitution</u>, which ran in the October 19 issue of the *Centre Daily Times*. They remind us that "to return to a balanced consideration of attempts to amend our Constitution, learn which candidates support these amendments, and vote accordingly."

All About Standardized Tests

We often hear negative comments about standardized tests, but these tests have an important purpose in education. Used correctly, standardized tests, like the state assessments, can be used to identify strengths and weaknesses in students, classes, subject areas, and larger student populations.

Grading practices can vary widely among teachers, and although many complain about the "bubble answer sheets," standardized tests are objective. Teachers use test information to get a big picture of subject area mastery, improve instruction, or see the impact of a new curriculum.

Large scale tests can be comparative and are used to compare schools or school districts to another and determine which schools are making progress for accountability. **All public schools take the state assessments**, including charter schools. Many parochial schools also participate in the state testing program which enables comparison to the public schools. Pennsylvania has a Standards Aligned System where both instruction and the state tests are aligned to the same set of standards.

The Standards Aligned System Assessment Center has tools for teachers to ensure this alignment: <u>Standards Aligned Assessment Center</u>. In a Standards Aligned System, teachers are not teaching to the test, but teaching to the standards.




The fair features several fun events for both children and adults including author readings, children's drum circle,

Table Sitters for Ten Thousand Villages Days




