

Election results: what happened to the proposed constitutional amendments? And other happy developments

One aspect of the election results hasn't gotten play in the press: as a practical matter, the proposed constitutional amendments we wrote about in the fall effectively are dead. Amendments must be passed in two consecutive sessions, by both Houses of the Pennsylvania Legislature, before they appear on your ballot. The amendments were passed in the session ending this month, by Republican majorities in each house. Now that Democrats have recaptured the State House, the odds of the required passage in this session are approximately zero.


Here's another great thing. We anticipate the Democrats will elect the first woman Speaker of the House—but that's not assured, and could take some time to unfold. The reason is that the Democrats hold a majority by one seat. One member died just before the election and the special election to replace him may or may not be held February 7, due to a jurisdictional squabble. Another member, Summer Lee, won a seat for Congress while also being reelected to her State House seat. She must resign by January 3, the date of the Congressional swearing-in. Yet still another House member, Austin Davis, was reelected to the House while also being elected Lt. Governor. He must resign by the Pennsylvania swearing-in on January 17.

All three seats are safely Democratic, but with the vacancies, the question becomes, on what

date are the elections for Speaker held? We don't know when all the special elections to fill the vacancies will occur. We only know that the last date possible is primary election day, but we don't know when that is, either, as the primary calendar hasn't been set. Other complications exist, but it should work out in the end. The current Democratic Leader, Rep. Joanna McClinton, is likely the Speaker in the fullness of time. Speaking of women advancing in elective office, when Pennsylvania Rep. Summer Lee is sworn into Congress, she will become the 5th Congresswoman from Pennsylvania. All are Democrats. Nationwide, next year 12 states will have women governors, an increase from the current nine.

We have a way to go for equality in elective office, but this is what progress looks like. Raise a glass!

Cyber charter school funding needs to be revised

Although the 2015 revision of the school funding formula is based on enrollment, problems persist with cyber charter school funding. The problem is that our state's 14 cyber charter schools receive the same funding as the public schools even though they are online operations with lower expenses than brick-and-mortar schools. In Pennsylvania, schools receive funding on a per-student basis, which means that both brick-and-mortar and

cyber charter schools receive the same per-pupil funds from the district, minus certain categories of spending and federal funds. When a child leaves for a charter school, district expenses do not decrease; "fixed costs" remain, such as debt, salaries, building maintenance, utilities, and transportation.

Thus, cyber charters receive funding that is approximately double their actual cost. These excess public funds are used for executive compensation, advertising, and management fees, while student achievement and graduation rates in cyber charters remain considerably lower than regular public schools. To date, no cyber charter school has ever achieved a passing score on the state school performance profile rating system. To limit the non-educational spending, Pennsylvania needs a formula for cyber charter schools that eliminates excesses and reflects the actual cost of operation. 

December 16-24: Las Posadas - The religious festival of Las Posadas is primarily celebrated in Latin American countries, Mexico, and Spain. Some Hispanics in the United States also celebrate this festival. The

festival is a reenactment of Mary and Joseph traveling to various homes in the community that are designated as "inns." After the reenactment, there is a celebration.

December 18-26: Hanukkah - Hanukkah is an 8-day, 8-night celebration in the Jewish faith honoring the triumph of their ancestors over the Syrian Greeks. To see the "Festival of Lights" observed, ask to join in a night of celebrations with a Jewish friend's family.

December 21: Winter Solstice/Yule - The Winter Solstice is known as Yule to those practicing the Pagan and Wiccan faiths. The day marks the longest night of the year and the return of the sun. You can celebrate Yule by lighting a Yule log, making an evergreen wreath, having a nature-based treat, and decluttering your space.

December 25: Christmas - Christmas is an important Christian holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. In many countries Christmas is often celebrated as a secular holiday by people of all faiths.

December 26: Kwanzaa - Kwanzaa is an 8-day celebration of life that is inspired by the African harvest celebrations. The holiday was created by American professor of African Studies, activist, and author Maulana Karenga. It has been celebrated since the 1960s.



The Board of Directors met on November 7 and the Executive Board met on December 3. Their actions included:

- Expressed appreciation to Suzanne Kerlin for producing the 2022-2023 *Handbook/Directory* and to Connie Schroeder for her informative and timely *Branch Bulletin*.
- Acknowledged Vasundara Varadan for obtaining the new professional Zoom program and Naana Nti for her support of Zoom the past two years.
- Approved the 501 c (4) budget for 2022-23. The 2021-22 budget was audited.
- Approved the appointment of the 2022-23 Nominating Committee. Members are Mary Dupuis (convenor), Carol-Beth Book, Sherry Crassweller, Nancy Weinreb, and Amy Wilson.
- Discussed engaging former members of the Clearfield and Lock Branches.
- Approved a mid-year Community Action Grant to Bellefonte Reads for \$1500.
- Determined that the Branch "watch party" on the AAUW PA program on reproductive rights with a follow-up discussion will be held in January at Vasundara Varadan's home.
- The annual program featuring women from the Humphrey Fellows program will be held February 13th at the Graduate.

- Discussed a new team approach to marketing and communications, especially for the web updates and social media.
- Updated Board members on the Used Book Sale. The Workshop has been sold to Continental Real Estate Mgmt., Inc., which will honor our lease through June 2024. The new Penn State parking charges for the 2023 sale will be \$540 with increases to follow. The sale will close at 7 p.m. on Bag Day. A volunteer coordinator (s) is still needed.
- Agreed to a new timeline for the *Strategic Plan* and recommended possible team members for the four themes.
- With the concurrence of the Community Action Grant Committee, approved a
 repurposing of the Community Action Grant originally to be used for a Centre Safe
 program to the purchase of retail gift cards to meet the needs of women and children
 victimized by domestic abuse.
- The next General Board meeting will be January 9th.
