### ***Justine Johnson - DCNR Ranger, Black Moshannon State Park***

At a young age, Justine Johnson knew she wanted to be a Park Ranger. Her family spent time in the outdoors traveling, camping, hiking, and fishing every summer. At age twenty, Justine started her career as a Park Patrol Officer at Delaware Seashore State Park. She completed the Park Law Enforcement Training at Slippery Rock University in 2011.

Justine worked as a Protection Ranger for the National Park Service at C&O Canal National Historical Park in Maryland, Yosemite National Park in California, and Assateague Island National Seashore in Maryland. Between 2014-2016, Justine worked as a park ranger in several different state parks. In 2017 she transferred to Black Moshannon State Park.

Justine works hard to keep the park and its visitors safe, while providing education on conserving and protecting the natural resources. Justine performs park patrols, medical assists, search and rescues, and enjoys interacting with the public. Next, Justine hopes to become supervisor as a Chief Ranger and to work toward becoming a Field Training Officer and Search and Rescue Manager. Justine resides in Morrisdale with her husband Cory, who is a DCNR Ranger Supervisor at Bald Eagle State Park.



## ADVOCACY OPPORTUNITIES for SCHOOL FUNDING – JOIN US MAY 24<sup>th</sup>

The in-court testimony for the school funding lawsuit trial was concluded on March 10<sup>th</sup> after four months, 40 witnesses, and thousands of documents entered into record. Children First and Education Voters PA have organized two events in Harrisburg to support adequate school funding to enable quality public education, regardless of local wealth. Related to this trial, there are current opportunities to advocate for fair public school funding. A press event took place on **Wednesday, April 13<sup>th</sup>**: "Toddlers to Tassels: A Rally to Fully and Fairly Fund Education" from 10 am -12 noon on the Capitol steps. Then on **Tuesday, May 24<sup>th</sup>**, Lobby Day will be held. This day provides AAUW members an opportunity to meet with our legislators and voice support for the Governor's full proposed education budget.

### **Samira Gendy – Simmons-Jansma Project Renew Grant**

Samira's mother, a single mother of three, was diagnosed with cancer when Samira was still in high school. Due to becoming her caregiver and the emotional and financial distress, Samira had to drop out of high school during her senior year. After her mother passed away, Samira was homeless for over three years. With the help of Centre Safe (formerly the Centre County Women's Resource Center) Samira became grounded, got a job and her own apartment, and earned her high school diploma through Pennsylvania Cyber Charter School.

In 2019 Samira enrolled at Penn State, where she is World Campus student. She is a Letters, Arts & Science major and has two minors (Human Development and Family Studies & Nutrition). Samira holds a 3.61 cumulative GPA with an anticipated graduation date of December, 2024. She volunteers with Out of The Cold and at St. Vincent de Paul's Thrift Store.



### **Kiana Leija – Evelyn Marboe Scholarship**

With undiagnosed mental health conditions and a lack of adequate guidance and support, Kiana was forced to interrupt her educational endeavors twice. She started at the University of Texas in 2012, dropped and matriculated again in 2015. Still without adequate treatment, Kiana left the University for the second time and moved to Pennsylvania to live at the Himalayan Institute, where she was able to receive appropriate support and care. Her personal experience with mental health issues motivated her to redefine her educational goals.

Kiana was accepted at Penn State in 2019 and is planning to graduate in December, 2022 with a major in Human Development & Family Studies. Kiana holds a 3.76 cumulative GPA. Kiana participated in and helped with the Girl Scouts, and continues to provide support and services at the Himalayan Institute, a non-profit organization.



***Kendra Napier-Fonash – Suzanne McCrae Kerlin Scholarship***

When Kendra's parents separated while her father was stationed overseas, her mother returned to Pennsylvania with the children. Kendra's upbringing was full of emotional distress, lack of self-confidence, and self-esteem issues stemming from parental mental illness. She didn't see herself as having college potential and was often told she was "too stupid to go to college." Instead, she became a Certified Nursing Assistant, Patient Care Assistant, and Medical Secretary.

Through perseverance and personal growth, Kendra was admitted to Penn State in the summer 2010 and is pursuing a B.S. in English with an African American and Women's Studies minor. Her expected graduation date is May, 2023. Kendra helps with AAUW's book sale.



***Tiara Hernandez – AAUW State College Branch Scholarship***

Tiara attended Penn State 2012-2016. She was a child of the foster care system. In 2016, Tiara faced financial and academic challenges and was placed on a one-year expulsion with a therapy mandate as a condition to reapply. In the spring of 2017, she secured stable work and found supportive housing in a transitional program for young adults aging out of the New York City foster care system.

In the fall of 2019, Tiara returned to State College, successfully applied to have her expulsion from 2016 lifted, and since then has been diligently paying her debt to a collection agency. Tiara plans to complete a B.S. in Human Development and Family Studies with intended graduation date of May, 2023.

Tiara works as a part-time certified peer specialist for Cen-Clear Child Services, and also part-time for Out of the Cold. She has also donated a painting to the ClearWater Conservancy.

**Move-in Night** – We are short some volunteers this year and the job goes much faster for everyone when we have a full schedule.

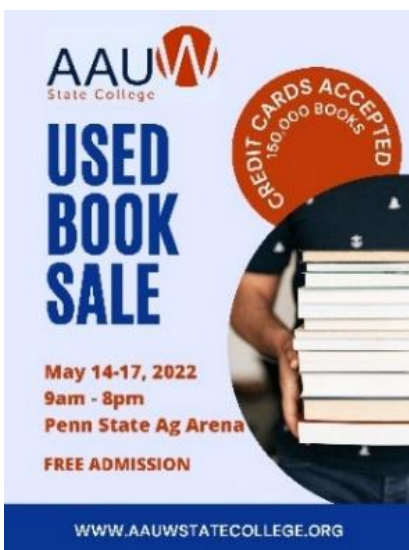
**Cashiers** – Cashiers will receive training before their shifts and will not need to use their own phones for doing transactions because devices will be provided.

For their capstone project, the seniors in COMM 473: Public Relations Campaigns were asked to apply their professional knowledge to creating membership and marketing campaigns for AAUW State College. The project outline was a collaboration between Cindy Hall and Carolyn Donaldson, our co-VPs for Marketing & Communications, and Assistant Professor Dr. LaShonda Eaddy. Five teams provided specialized presentations to a dozen AAUW State College Board members in the new Bellisario Media Center at Penn State.

The students' recommendations included funding and focusing on social media, building partnerships with community and Penn State groups, hiring an intern to work on social media, and engaging members in Branch activities to ensure their retention. The Board members in attendance found the presentations to be creative and inspiring, and plan to use the information as the Branch crafts a new strategic plan in the next months.
